

<u>A brief summary of the work by CGG and FSFP to uncover</u> <u>the unlawful plot to access, copy and covertly distribute</u> <u>voting software, by the Trump campaign</u>.

May 13, 2022, Washington Post: <u>Georgia county under scrutiny after claim of post-election breach</u>

In February 2022, after receiving consistent denials from the Secretary of State's office that any unauthorized access to the voting system had occurred, Marilyn Marks (CGG) reached out to press to help research the allegations of the Coffee County breach. This May 2022 Washington Post article by Emma Brown began to provide details demonstrating that the breach could no longer be denied. This breakthrough permitted CGG to obtain permission from the Court to undertake discovery including depositions on the alleged Coffee County breach. Susan Greenhalgh (FSFP) sat in on all depositions, providing Marks and attorneys with expert consulting input for development of discovery inquiries.

There have been public reports of <u>software breaches in other states</u>, conducted by Trump allies. This is the first evidence of a breach in Georgia. The story reports that, despite several alarming clues, the Georgia Secretary of State failed to investigate the breach in Coffee County. If not for the Curling suit and CGG's work, the Georgia breach would never have been uncovered.

August 15, 2022, <u>Washington Post: Trump-allied lawyers pursued voting</u> machine data in multiple states, records reveal

Emails and documents obtained by CGG and the Curling plaintiffs provide definitive proof that the software breach occurred, (contrary to denials by the Georgia Secretary of State's office). More importantly, the discovery documents include the bombshell that the breach was directed and funded by attorneys for the Trump campaign, including Sidney Powell, and that it was part of a multi-state plan to access software in other states.

September 6, 2022, Associated Press: <u>Video fills in details on alleged Ga.</u> <u>election system breach</u>

From March 2022 until late August 2022, Coffee County attorneys repeatedly denied the existence of any security video records from the period of the breach, but CGG continued to press through its subpoenas, until the exterior video was finally produced in late August. The surveillance footage from Coffee County showed details of the breach and those that participated. The <u>video</u> also shows that key players, like <u>Cathy Latham (the former chair of the area GOP, and a "fake elector" in Georgia) lied in their depositions</u> in the Curling lawsuit. The video also underscores the failure of the Georgia Secretary of State to responsibly investigate the alarming clues, highlighted more than a year earlier, that indicated the security of the Georgia voting system may have been compromised in Coffee County.

September 20, 2022 New footage confirms fake Trump elector spent hours inside Georgia elections office day it was breached

In late September 2022, interior video records were suddenly located, after months of denials of their existence.

September 28, 2022, Georgia State Election Board meeting.

The chair of the Georgia State Election Board state in a public meeting that he has requested the FBI investigate saying: "Because the conduct in Coffee County paralleled conduct in other states, we requested the Federal Bureau of Investigations Office in the Southern District of Georgia to participate in the investigation."

October 28, 2022, Washington Post: <u>What happened with voting machines in</u> <u>Coffee County, Georgia?</u>

The Washington Post writes a comprehensive report on the sprawling story that summarizes key findings to date.

November 18th and 22nd: CGG and Curling plaintiffs take depositions of Doug Logan and his cohort, Jeff Lenberg. Both testify that they have not they have not been contacted by federal or Georgia law enforcement, indicating that the federal agencies had not launched an investigation.

As a consulting expert to CGG, Susan Greenhalgh of Free Speech For People was alarmed that there seems to be no federal investigation. After conferring with the legal team, Free Speech For People sent a <u>letter</u> to the US Department of Justice, Special Counsel Jack Smith, FBI Director Chris Wray and Jen Easterly, director of the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency of the Department of Homeland Security, that detailed evidence that was developed in the Curling lawsuit, that indicates there was a multistate plot to access voting software, directed and funded by lawyers for Donald Trump.

December 13, 2022, Washington Post: <u>Advocates seek federal investigation of</u> <u>multistate effort to copy voting software</u>

The Washington Post reports on the FSFP letter and request for investigation.

February 8, 2023: The FBI replies to FSFP advising it is not investigating the software breach in Georgia.

March 9, 2023, Los Angeles Times: <u>Are the feds ignoring Trump allies' multi-</u> state effort to access election systems? Experts raise alarms for 2024

The LA Times reports on the FBI's response and the concern that federal law enforcement and the Special Counsel are not investigating the multistate plot to take voting software.

March 30, 2023, Los Angeles Times: <u>Far-right presentation using</u> <u>misappropriated election software alarms experts</u>

The LA Times reports on the fact that the software was used in a presentation to advance disinformation at the Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC), claiming that Trump won the 2020 election.

April 18, 2023: After an in depth review of testimony and evidence provided to the January 6th Committee, Free Speech For People sends a <u>letter</u> to the Justice Department, Special Counsel and FBI detailing testimony that suggests that Donald Trump was aware of the unlawful plot to take voting system software.

April 21, 2023, CNN: <u>Text messages reveal Trump operatives considered</u> using breached voting data to decertify Georgia's Senate runoff in 2021

CNN reports on evidence from Curling that shows that Trump's attorneys considered using the misappropriated software to try to decertify the Georgia Senate run-off elections that resulted in wins by Jon Ossoff and Reverend Raphael Warnock, tipping control of the Senate.

April 21, 2023, New York Times: <u>Testimony Suggests Trump Was at Meeting</u> <u>About Accessing Voting Software</u>

The New York Times reports on the April 18th letter from Free Speech For People which provides evidence that suggests Donald Trump was atop the plan to take voting system software.

April 24, 2023, Deadline White House.
